A PASTORAL MESSAGE

Post-pandemic.

Those are two words I'm seeing a lot in my ministry inbox. As we talk about turning the corner on the pandemic what is next? What has changed, maybe forever, and what has not? What must a church like ours reinvent and what can we simply resume? What have we learned? There is an old saying, "Never waste a good crisis!"

These conversations are happening here at First Presbyterian Church. We are looking at our priorities and programs and asking, "What must change to be faithful in the future, and what must persist to be faithful to the past?" Such things are both exhilarating and

exhausting, so pray for our congregation's leadership, and pray for yourself, as we consider life and ministry after the pandemic.

One thing that must persist is the faithful celebration of the heart of our faith - the good news of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. In this newsletter you will find early information on how we plan to come together this year for the celebration of Easter. I'm excited, and I think you will be, too!

One thing that appears likely not to change post-pandemic are the public divisions that impact our personal relationships. It seems to me a healthy congregation in our day must learn to steer between two dangerous shoals: stay silent about the difficult issues of our time and risk giving the message that the Christian faith has nothing valuable to say about them. Or, talk about them in endless and partisan ways, and risk giving the message they are the reason we exist. Either way the good news of the Kingdom of God suffers.

In my devotions this morning in Seeking God's Face, I came across a prayer written a few years ago:

Brother Jesus, out of the entire human race, from the beginning of time to this world's dying seconds, you gather together the most unlikely people as a family. Politically left and right, rich and poor, crooks and commoners,

written in God's love and in memory of Shelba Jean Watson (1938-2021)

I want to thank everyone in my First Presbyterian Church family for the cards, and condolences, both in person and on social media after my mother, Shelba's, passing on Jan. 24. In the past year, Donna and I have dealt with enormous grief, losing Ma Bass, Willis, and now Ma Watson.

In times like these, grief can overcome other aspects of life. How we cope says a lot about who we are. We all have, or will deal, with grief in our lifetimes. God made each of us unique yet there is no escaping the emotions when a loved one is no longer with us. They can make us stronger or keep us stuck in grief until we find a healthy outlet.

I will forever remember the moment my sister, Renee, called. She was crying, and I knew mom was with Jesus. I chose not to stay emotional, and chose the path moving forward. Coping with grief is a process. One does not just go to bed, wake up, and all is well in the morning.

Stephen Ministers offer series a books after a loss titled "A Time to Grieve" by Kenneth C. Haugk. I like to refer to the section in book one that lists the "3 Ns of grief"-normal, natural, and necessary.

Normal

"Grief is normal because it is how people respond to a significant personal loss. It's normal to expect people who've lost someone they love to be deeply affected by their loss."*

This is precisely the hospice chaplaincy emphasis when helping families cope and prepare. The grief is normal, what's different is how each individual deals with the loss. While some may mean well when saying "cry it out," it may be more helpful to say "find a way to cope as well as you can." We have permission to grieve in the unique ways God designed for us.

This is a prayer for what we can become, not a program to make it happen. We must learn, different as we are, about how to bring Jesus Christ to bear on what matters in life and how to talk about it with each other.

This is not easy work, but faithfulness to Christ and love for one another calls us to get on with it. I hope you will join me in praying this prayer in the coming month, and asking God about our role in making it so.

"Grief is natural in that it's a
completely human thing to do. We can't
avoid grief - it's built into us. We're
created to grieve, just as we're created to
love. We love, and when we lose
someone, we grieve."*

The shortest verse in the Bible, John 11:35, reads, "Jesus wept". Jesus was the Son of God yet here we see Him cry when He heard that Lazarus was dead! Jesus Christ mourned the loss of a good friend, therefore we are ok to do the same. After all, we were created in His image. The grief is a bittersweet expression of the deep love we had for someone.

Necessary
"Grief provides a healthy way to cope with
the loss and everything it means to us.
Trying to ignore or avoid grief won't work.
It will only make the grief last longer and
possibly cause even more pain."*

There are about 64 verses in the Bible about grief. Psalm 34:18 is one I often share:

The Lord is close to the brokenhearted, and saves those who are crushed in spirit.

It's ok if grief is a struggle. That is just the beginning. If we keep close to God, He will in time save our crushed spirit. We will be stronger for it. God will use us and our experience to help others with their losses. I hope I did that today.

If you find yourself struggling with grief, know that God cares for you, and He will provide a way out. That may be talking with a good friend, contacting our Stephen ministers, me as your Pastoral Care minister, or a grief support group in a formal or informal setting.

Singing Again!

How exciting it is to hear the choir and children sing once more! After almost a year without live choral music and anthems, we are taking baby steps back into the world of choral sound.

Safety is still of the utmost concern, so the choir members continue to sing in masks. And the children have face shields to protect them, allowing them to sing either with or without their mask beneath the shield.

February 14 saw the return of 15 adults singing an anthem, "How I Love Jesus" as they distanced themselves on risers and in the chancel area. And the following week, Feb. 21, 16 of our PreK through 5th grade children played handchimes drums, and praised God with choreography while singing "Jesus Only You." What Joy!

By creatively spreading out the risers in individual sections on the floor in front of the pulpit, we have found a way to expand our ability to place singers safely for singing. The All Church Choir is rehearsing to sing again on March 14, and our children will be leading the entire worship service on Children's Sunday/ Palm Sunday, March 28.

During this Lenten season, we will not sing songs of lament! We will sing songs of Praise and Thanksgiving! Knowing Christ can walk with us, change our hearts and continues to care for us, we celebrate our Savior in Song! The lyrics to all hymns and anthems are now being printed in the worship service bulletins that are sent electronically and available in the narthex. Won't you sing along?

Did you know that we are planning to have a very large tent outside in which to hold the April 4 Easter Worship service? Be prepared to be greeted by sounds of brass instruments with timpani! Imagine being able to sing together outside, joining voices in those favorite Easter hymns: "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today"; "Christ is Alive!"; and "Christ Is Risen! Shout Hosanna!" The All Church Choir is also busy preparing a special anthem with brass accompaniment for this special Easter Celebration.


